Foreword

As an American University student in the early '70s, I learned from a great faculty, a cohort of aspiring young artists drawn from all over the world, and the Watkins Collection. It revealed little-known masters, those not so close to the media spotlight, and it still shapes how I see the world today.

The Watkins Collection was our secret weapon. Luciano was followed by Ron Haynie, who directed the Watkins Collection and Gallery and, as an artist, made sunlight falling on a sprouting onion seem the most beautiful thing in the world. His eloquence still takes my breath away.

Integrity is the word I would apply to American University's Art Department, and that integrity is reflected everywhere in its collection. Now the Katzen Arts Center provides a home befitting the collection. A soaring, spacious museum serves as the public gateway to American University. At the head of Embassy Row in our nation's capital, the museum beckons the world to its doors. It is especially satisfying that the gift begun in honor of C. Law Watkins and nurtured by dedicated artists for so many years, will now find the audience it deserves.
